<p>4.0 Advanced Health updates</p>	<p>Updates from Curry County:</p> <p>Advanced Health has received an Intent to Contract for 5 years for Curry and Coos from the state to continue administering OHP. The next step is the Readiness to Review in August of 2019 where all of the documents will be reviewed. Public presentations will also be required in each county.</p> <p>Curry Advanced Health had the biggest turnout thus far for their monthly Community Case Management meeting, which is convened to improve the coordination of care for our members. The August meeting will be at the Resource Center and Brown Bag Lunch with</p>

(Get date for meeting)</p> <p>Maggie in-serviced all of the Curry Clinic managers on our new Interpreter Services as we now have a staff member certified as Spanish speaking who can be scheduled to come to the clinic to interpret during provider medical appointments.</p> <p>Maggie is assisting in revising the Guide to Pregnancy & Birth Control Resources to include Curry County resources.</p> <p>Bonnie Ell provided a recap of the CHIP priority areas and announced that we would be collaborating with the AllCare Health CAC moving forward on CHIP projects.</p>		
<p>5.0 Curry Public Library</p>	<p>Career Navigator- Rusty White spoke about Curry Public Library’s Career Navigation program. Rusty mentioned that they are waiting for grant funding approval- they should know by September of 2020.</p> <p>Rusty mentioned there was a gap in services for teens. They formed a Youth Advisory Board and hosted teen nights.</p> <p>They quickly found they were on the ‘frontline’ of meeting the teens where they’re at and helping to meet their needs. They are working to help centralize services for teens by connecting them with work source opportunities where they wouldn’t need to travel from Brookings to Gold Beach to access those services.</p> <p>They began recruiting by setting up tables at the grocery store on the 1st day of the month when food stamps are handed out- they asked the</p>		



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	<p>youth if they were out of school and out of work. Then the program spread by word of mouth</p> <p>They then began to form an alliance of community partners (SCBEC, DHS, ORCCA, etc). They help the teens get their GEDs, transport them to Coos Bay to take the test, and then help them with job search training and interviewing.</p> <p>Over the course of 2 years: Engaged with 40 youth- many with positive outcomes</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 4 completed GED - 2 received high school employment - 5 participated in on-site work experiences - 2 were hired to full time jobs - 2 enrolled in post-secondary opportunities <p>Curry Opportunity Youth went from 26.6% to 21%</p> <p>Curry Public Library is hopeful that by the end of summer they will be established as an official GED host site, so that youth won't have to travel to Coos Bay.</p> <p>Sherri Estell thanked Rusty for his work in supporting youth and asked if a survey could be taken of high school students to see what their career interests are and to help bring in career exploration opportunities.</p> <p>The career navigation program is partnering with Freeman Marine for CT (Career Technical education) internship opportunities and on the job training.</p> <p>Connie Hunter and Gordon Clay both mentioned the career fair opportunity that is in</p>		
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	<p>the near future and would be a great opportunity for the youth to take part in.</p> <p>Beth Barker-Hidalgo mentioned that there is a deficit of accredited teachers in Curry County and that there is a desperate need for that. Rusty said that there is also an opportunity for retirees to get their education credentials applied to their prior degrees to help fill this need.</p> <p>Bonnie Ell mentioned that there could be opportunities for Rusty to apply for Advanced Health CAC/CHIP</p>		
<p>6.0 Open Discussion/Community Updates</p>	<p>Gordon Clay provided an update about the completion of the Finding Hope project 7-10% of youth are cons</p> <p>Beth Barker-Hidalgo provided an update on the Resource Center and the services they offer (showers for women- soon will be offered for men, hygiene, job search help, clothing, food, etc)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Added 33 new clients, total of 52 - 6 OHP applications - 1st Rotary volunteer - 12+ job search/connections <p>Beth announced that the Resource Center hosts ORCCA staff rent free and that they are willing to host foster families while</p> <p>Beth Beasley mentioned that Art in the Park and Kickball Tournaments will continue to be hosted free of charge to the community.</p> <p>Mellissah Hendrickson (SCBEC), mentioned that scholarships are available for Curry residents, 4</p>		



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	<p>for truck drivers and 2- Certified Nursing Assistants.</p> <p>Natalie White mentioned that Oasis Shelter Home is doing a remodel- private businesses and agencies are partnering with them to sponsor room makeovers.</p> <p>Connie Hunter mentioned that it would be helpful to have a presenter to come down to Curry to present on the intergenerational disabilities due to agent orange.</p> <p>Dori Statton mentioned that a drop-in center will not be opening in Brookings, but within the next two years, a residential treatment center will open on site at CCH. Dr. Wipple is the new medical director, Behavioral Health Advisory meetings will host their next meeting in October 2019.</p> <p>Commissioner Court Boice mentioned the need to bring together a group to address the challenges and barriers that exist around the housing crisis in Curry County. He will be attending the Economic Development meeting in August and hopes to bring back information that will be helpful to all.</p>
