1.0 Call to Order	Sharon Daymond called the meeting to order at 12:10 pm.				
2.0 Council Business	<p>Dori Statton made a motion to approve the September 26, 2019 minutes. Connie Atwood seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. Sharon mentioned that the CAC members had voted on 4 new funding requests:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - \$2,500 (Oasis Shelter Home, Youth Survivor/Empowerment program) - \$2,500 (Brookings Harbor High School Athletic Department- AED equipment and supplies table) - \$1,030 (Meals on Wheels program for the Chetco Activity Center) - \$2,500 (Brookings Harbor Food Bank- Snack Pack Program) 				



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	<p>The CAC also voted in two new community members- Beth Barker-Hidalgo from United Way of Southwestern Oregon and the Curry Housing and Homeless Coalition, and Michelle Hanna, Social Determinants of Health with Coast Community Health.</p>		
<p>3.0 Traditional Healthcare Worker</p>	<p>Ross Acker, Director of Care Coordination from Advanced Health introduced the new Traditional Health Worker program that is being expanded between Coos and Curry counties. Ross introduced the partnership they have in mental health training with local law enforcement officers.</p> <p>Ross mentioned that the state recognized there was a critical need for collaboration in physical health and mental health in order to best meet the needs of our members and those with mental illness. ACT-MD is an app that is now serving thousands of individuals by connecting members with those involved in their care- it's essentially an online ACT Team. In order to help accomplish these goals, Advanced Health will be training new Traditional Healthcare Workers (THW).</p> <p>Michelle Hanna from Coast Community Health asked when the next training would be, as she would like to take it, but needs to know it will for sure take place. Ross mentioned it will be held at the end of January- date TBD.</p> <p>Dori Statton is there will be a communication piece that goes out to members that lets them know about the benefits of the THW. Leah Lorincz and Ross mentioned that yes, there would be a mailing going out with all of the updates, and Connie Atwood mentioned that this information could also be shared through the new Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) newsletter.</p>		
<p>4.0 Advanced Health Updates</p>	<p>Curry staff (Maggie Lowery and Jesse Leguee) supported two Curry members with gas cards for</p>		



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	<p>transportation needs not covered by Bay Cities Brokerage (BCB).</p> <p>Maggie and Jesse had their monthly Community Case Management meeting at Curry General Hospital with Greg Gill, Supervisor of Addictions at CCH, talking about his programs in Gold Beach and Brookings. He is still in need of a counselor in Port Orford, so there is no program there yet.</p> <p>Maggie hosted a talk for the pregnant mamas at Brighteyes Midwifery on maternal child resources in Curry County and also talked about the dangers associated with smoking while pregnant.</p> <p>Maggie did orientation training with two new wonderful Nurse Practitioners, Christina Ahear for Curry Community Health's Gold Beach clinic, and Sara Dickerson with Curry Health Network at the Gold Beach Clinic.</p> <p>Maggie hosted a meet & greet with all the clinic managers in Curry to introduce Advanced Health's new quality staff, Amarrisa Wooden and Lisa Caste to improve our Incentive Measure Metrics and this week Maggie is delivering all the 2018 Incentive checks to the administration of the clinics.</p> <p>Curry General Hospital needed 2 four wheeled walkers to facilitate discharges- the St. John Episcopal church Medical Loan closet in Bandon donated one standard and one bariatric to Curry General Hospital.</p> <p>Bonnie Ell reminded everyone that free trainings are available through South Coast Together on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and Resiliency.</p> <p>Bonnie also mentioned that the Curry Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) has the following workgroups forming and that anyone is welcome to join:</p>

Oregon Health Policy Board (OHPB) Health Equity Committee (HEC) adopted an agency wide Health Equity Definition. The definition can be further explained on the HEC presentation to OHPB from October 2019, found at: https://www.oregon.gov/oha/OEI/Pages/Health-Equity-Committee.aspx The definition: Oregon will have established a health system that creates 		



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	<p>health equity when all people can reach their full health potential and well-being and are not disadvantaged by their race, ethnicity, language, disability, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, social class, intersections among these communities or identities, or other socially determined circumstances. Achieving health equity requires the ongoing collaborations of all regions and sectors of the state, including tribal governments to address: The equitable distribution or redistribution of resources and power; and Recognizing, reconciling and rectifying historical and contemporary injustices.</p> <p>2. Update on the New Public Charge Rule webinar: The Community Partner Outreach Program in partnership with the Oregon Law Center, Causa Oregon and the Oregon Latino Health Coalition are hosting a webinar on November 14 to provide updates on the new federal Public Charge Rule, which has been temporarily blocked across the entire country and did not go into effect on October 15th. This book provides a snapshot of child and family wellbeing, made up of 21 indicators organized into 5 domains. Information shows specific county data as compared to statewide data. Postcards from the OHP were mailed to members in Clackamas, Multnomah, Washington, Lane, Douglas (partial), Jackson, and Polk counties on September 18th. The postcards let OHP members know an important letter will arrive in October with information about their CCO choices. Members in areas with changes to their CCO choices will have two opportunities to make decisions about their CCOs: October 16-November 17, 2019, and January 1 – March 31, 2020.
