## No OHA Public Health Updates for September

## **Mobile Health Unit Advisory Committee**

Section 1 of <u>House Bill 4052 (2022)</u> directs OHA to convene a committee to provide guidance on establishing, funding and operating a Mobile Health Unit pilot program to improve the health outcomes of Oregonians impacted by racism.

Starting October 2022, the group will meet twice a month to complete this work, which will inform OHA's efforts to expand health care access to under-served populations and support OHA's goal to eliminate health inequities by 2030.

OHA seeks members with a range of expertise and experience related to health care access in underserved communities, including individuals who:

- Deliver health care,
- Are interested in receiving care from mobile health units, and
- Have demonstrated effectiveness working with, and engaging, priority populations in their local communities.

OHA will prioritize applicants with lived experience in the priority populations defined in House Bill 4052.

## Oregon, Washington joined by Nevada in offering new prescription discount card

PORTLAND, Ore.—Nevada has just joined Oregon and Washington in offering the ArrayRx card, a state-backed program that can save individuals up to 80% for generic drugs and 20% for brand-name drugs.

The ArrayRx Card, formerly known as Oregon/Washington Prescription Discount Card, has helped more than 550,000 participants in both states save money on needed prescription drugs for nearly two decades.

Nevada Gov. Steve Sisolak received his prescription discount card Sept. 22 to celebrate the state's participation in the ArrayRx pharmacy discount program.

"Since 2003, Oregonians have been able to access our state sponsored pharmacy discount card, and today we welcome Nevadans to the ArrayRx family," said Trevor Douglass, M.D., pharmacy purchasing director at Oregon Health Authority (OHA). "Oregon and Washington have a rich history of collaborating on the pharmacy purchasing front."

By implementing the ArrayRx Card program, Nevada will be able to offer the same savings that people in Oregon and Washington have enjoyed, thanks to the expansion of the ArrayRx pooled purchasing potential.

#### **How the ArrayRx card works**

For people interested in using ArrayRx, the enrollment process is simple and free, and there no age or income restrictions. For those who have insurance, they can choose to use the ArrayRx Card or their pharmacy benefit at the point of sale, whichever provides a better price. All U.S. Food and Drug Administration-approved drugs prescribed by a licensed provider are eligible for a discount. Mail-order and specialty drugs are also available.

"The ArrayRx card was supportive to many Oregonians during the historic wildfires that broke out during Labor Day weekend 2020," said Heidi Murphy, pharmacy purchasing program and ArrayRx operations manager at OHA. "Evacuees were able to contact ArrayRx and quickly get discounted medications to replace those they had to leave behind when fleeing the fires. Receiving their needed medications helped provide some stability in an otherwise stressful and difficult situation."

Donna Sullivan, chief pharmacy officer for the Washington Health Care Authority, ArrayRx offers pharmacy benefit management services for local government, private sector businesses, labor organizations and individuals.

"Between 2003 and 2022, 1.2 million participants in Oregon and Washington benefitted from the ArrayRx services," Sullivan said. "We welcome the residents of Nevada to receive the same prescription drug discounts through the ArrayRx Card."

#### 1115 Medicaid Waiver

**SUD 1115 Bridge to the Bridge Amendment** 

<sup>\*\*</sup>Please note the webinar was previously scheduled for September 13.





The Bridge Program's goal is to maintain eligibility for individuals enrolled in OHP who would otherwise be found ineligible with incomes up to 200% FPL so that they remain covered in their current delivery system until the State can implement the Basic Health Program. The vision includes:

- Adults with incomes 138% to 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) remain in their CCOs
- Little to no cost to the enrollees
- Robust set of benefits
- Choice between Basic Health Program and subsidized Marketplace coverage

## **OHA releases biweekly COVID-19 reports**

The <u>COVID-19 Biweekly Data Report</u>, released today, shows a slight decrease in COVID-19-related hospitalizations and deaths.

Oregon Health Authority (OHA) reported 15,716 new cases of COVID-19 from July 24 to Aug. 6, a 15.4% decline from the previous biweekly total of 18,567.

During the two-week period of July 24 to Aug. 6, test positivity was 13.0%, down slightly from 13.8% in the previous two-week period.

Today's COVID-19 Biweekly Congregate Care Setting <u>Outbreak Report</u> shows 206 active outbreaks in care facilities, senior living communities and congregate care living settings with three or more confirmed COVID-19 cases or one or more COVID-19-related deaths.

#### Cases by ZIP code update

Today, OHA published updates to the <u>Oregon COVID-19 Cases by ZIP Code</u> dashboard report. Case rates were updated using 2020 data from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey. OHA had previously been using 2010 U.S. Census Bureau data to calculate rates. This aligns OHA's reporting of COVID-19 cases by ZIP code with people vaccinated with at least one dose of any COVID-19 vaccine by ZIP code.

Newly added filters let users explore data by county and urban/rural ZIP code designation. Changes to color coding better show the skewed distribution of case rates. Previously, case counts and case rates were not displayed for populations under 1,000 people. Case counts and case rates are now displayed for ZIP Code Tabulation Areas with 50 or more people. Case counts from ZIP codes with fewer than 10 cases, or with a case rate of 50,000 per 100,000 or more, will be reported in aggregate. This dashboard report will continue to be published weekly on Wednesdays.

## OHA updates dashboard on case demographics and disease severity

This week, the COVID-19 Case Demographic and Disease Severity dashboard will be removing and archiving the "Disease Severity" tab. Because case interviews are no longer required due to limited





capacity, data used on the "Disease Severity" tab, such as underlying conditions, are no longer collected. The tab will be removed from the dashboard.

For a comprehensive overview of COVID-19 infections and underlying conditions, please refer to the updates from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, published on <u>June 17</u> and <u>July 8</u>.
